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Modeling and control of a permanent magnet Synchronous generator driven by a wind turbine

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Abstract—in this paper, we study the modeling and the control strategy of a variable-speed wind turbine using the permanent magnet synchronous generator (PMSG) driven by a wind turbine emulator. To emulate the wind turbine, an emulator based on a DC motor is used to perform as the real wind turbine when it receives the same wind profile. The generator side is controlled to obtain maximum power from the incident wind by applying the strategy of Maximum Power Point Tracking (MPPT) using optimal torque control, which will allows the PMSG to operate at an optimal speed. The model system is developed in Matlab/Simulink environment .The results of various simulations have shown the dynamic performances and effectiveness of the proposed control strategy.

Keywords: Field oriented control Maximum power point tracking; Permanent-magnet synchronous generator; control vector; Wind turbine emulator; Variable Speed -Wind Energy Conversion Systems.

1. Introduction

In a context of global energy crisis underpinned by the need for sustainable development (environmental issues, depletion of fossil resources...), the challenges of future energy require the development of renewable energy as alternative sources, clean and inexhaustible [1].

Over the last years, with technological advancement, wind power has grown rapidly and becomes the most competitive form of renewable energy [1-2]. Actually, there are many good reasons for using more wind energy on power grids. as examples The price of wind power is therefore much more stable than the volatile prices of fossil fuel sources[3]. The marginal cost of wind energy once a station is constructed is usually less than 1-cent per kW·h. This cost has additionally reduced as wind turbine technology has improved [4].

In this context, Variable Speed Wind Energy Conversion Systems (VS-WECS) are considered the famous technologies in the present wind power industry. There are many several advantages for using (VS-WECS), for instance the ability to operate with Maximum Power Point Tracking (MPPT) in order to extract maximum power at different wind, higher efficiency, high power quality and it can be also used to reduce aerodynamic noise and mechanical stress on VS-WECS by absorbing the wind-power fluctuations [5-6].

Permanent magnet synchronous generator (PMSG) based variable speed wind turbines have many advantages such are considered stable, secure, and they don't need a gearbox. The PMSG has an important property manifested in its self-

excitation, which allows operation at high power factor and high efficiency [7–9].

Several works that are made preoccupy only the modeling and control of the generator side, without taking into account the emulation of the turbine. In our perspective this idea will focus on emulating the turbine by a DC motor to arrive to interconnect and control complete system (Wind turbine and PMSG).

This work has, three main objectives, the first is realization of the wind turbine emulator DC motor in order to emulate the behavior of a real variable speed wind turbine, the second is realization of extracting maximum power point technique, and third is controlling PMSG wind energy generation system by using FOC strategy.

To achieve that, we chose one of the best topologies that operate on variable-speed; this last enables the turbine to operate at its maximum power coefficient over a wide range of wind speeds.

The PMSG is connected to the DC bus via an AC-DC converter; this converter allows the control of the PMSG to track the maximum power.

Comprehensive models of the WECS considering system dynamics, and control actions are presented in MATLAB/SIMULINK environment.

2. WIND TURBINE MODEL

The amount of power captured by the wind turbine (power delivered by the rotor) [10-11] is given by:

Where ρ the air density (kg/m³), Rt is the blade length (m), V is wind speed (m/s) and C_p is the power coefficient. The value of C_p is dependent on the tip speed ratio (λ) and the blades pitch angle (β).

The blades pitch angle is adjusted by the embedded pitch controllers and depends on the type and operating condition of the wind turbine.

In the literature, approximate expression of the power factor C_p [12] for wind turbines with variable speed is proposed in (2).




Figure 1. Characteristics of power coefficient.

Fig.1 shows the variation of C_p as a function of λ , where we see that the maximum value of C_p = 0.4366 is achieved for

In order to maintain the power coefficient at its maximum we use the MPPT control, the results simulation of this strategy control is shown in Fig.3 and 4.

3. MPPT CONTROL

The objective of the (MPPT) strategy is to maintain the coefficient of power to its maximum value in such way to extract the maximum power.

The optimal power can be generated from a variable speed wind turbine by operating the maximum power coefficient C_p^{opt} .

on the electromagnetic motor torque to be equal to its optimal reference value.




Figure 2. Diagram block of MPPT strategy.

Where G_i proportional gain of the controller; τ_i : time constant; Ω_{ref} : mechanical speed reference. The complete scheme of MPPT strategy is represented in Fig.2.




Figure 3. Coefficient of power MPPT control

Fig.3 show that is the coefficient of power maintained at its maximum value, after a small dynamic, regardless of the wind speed, which involves extracting of the maximum power.




Figure 4. Mechanical speed.

TURBINE EMULATOR




Figure 5. Emulator of windtorque.

The wind turbine can be emulated by DC motor rotating at a variable speed which the torque depends on the coefficient power. The block diagram of Fig. 5 is introduced to develop the desired electromagnetic torque to reproduce on the mechanical shaft torque of the DC motor of the wind turbine.

The expression of the torque is obtained from (6) and from the coefficient of power curve shown in Figure 1.The block v(t) is an arbitrary signal varying between 9m/s and 14m/s.

DC motor and PMSG mechanically coupled, have different characteristics which need to regulate the excitation of the DC motor current, to reduce the flow produced by the inductor.

4.1 Excitation current

From equation $E = K_t * I_e * \Omega$ the current reference torque expressed as: $I_{eref} = \frac{E_{nom}}{K_t * \Omega}$ (6) is expressed as:

4.2 Armature current

The current reference I_{eref} is obtained $E = K_t * I_e * \Omega$, this current is given by:

The chosen controllers are a PI whose transfer functions




Figure 6. Schematic of control strategy for DC motor.

MODELING AND CONTROL OF THE PMSG SIDE-CONVERTER

Modeling machines is essential both for the designer and for the automation. It is generally used for the analysis of system behavior. The alternating current machines are generally modeled by nonlinear equations (differential equations). This nonlinearity is due to inductance and dynamic coefficients of the equations dependent rotor position and time. A transformation of park is necessary to simplify the model (reducing the number of equations).




Figure 7. Schematic of the generator side.

The Electrical model of a PMSG is usually expressed in the rotating reference frame d-q as frame as follows [13]:

Where V_{sd}, V_{sq}: d-q axis stator voltage; i_{sd}, i_{sq}: d-q axis stator current; Ls: stator inductance; Rs: stator resistance ; ω: electric pulsation; $Ψ_f$: magnetic flux.

The torque is given by:

Where L_d , L_q are the two axes machine inductances; P is the number of pole pairs.

Among the strategies applied to vector control a synchronous machine, considered more famous, which is to impose a reference i_{sd} direct current to zero [14]. The expression (12) of the electromagnetic torque is reduced to (13). The latter is adjusted by varying the quadrature current isq.

Reference value in the q-axis machine iqs_ref, is obtained by the electromagnetic torque reference C_{em ref} given by:

5.1 Synthesis correctors

For torque control is proposed to implement two controllers in the command structure. Correctors currents will be adjusted in the same manner as transfer functions on both axes are the same for the machine without salience (smooth pole). So the parameters of the two controllers beings the same (Fig. 8).

From equation (12) and (13), the transfer function of the machine can be written as:

Where $\tau_i=\frac{L_S}{R_S}$ is an electrical time constant. The transfer function of the selected PI is given by:

It is considered that the current measurement in our study is perfect and without delay therefore:

5.2 Determination of current references and control signals

To determine the control of the machine we will determine in the first instance its model under Causal Ordering Graph (IGC). The Causal Ordering Graph (ICG) is a graphical tool for modeling physical and designing their control systems [15] [16]. It is a graphical representation of the energy information

passing within a system. It provides a model of a system that respects natural causality of the process and to facilitate analysis and understanding.




Figure 9. IGC modeling of PMSG.

We can establish from equations 12, 13 the model of the synchronous machine as informational causal graph (Fig.9).




Figure 10. IGC control of PMSG.

Designing a controller based on a preliminary analysis of the dependencies between variables in controlling and sizes of control. The graphs informational approach is a valuable aid in this process. The Fig. 10 shows the control of the PMSG, this control can be deducted by inverting its ICG model.

Table 1 summarizes all of the relations that exist , C1 and C2 are the controllers of current loops.




Figure 11. a Determination of the voltage Vsd_reg.

Based on IGC Fig.10 and the table 1 we can deduce the block diagram of the control of the machine the latter is represented in Fig.11a,b.




Figure.11b Determination of the voltage Vsq_reg.

After having determined the voltage adjustments, it remains to determine the control signals applied to the converter.

6. MODEL OF CONVERTER

We opt for a continuous model in the equivalent of Reference Park for modeling our converter. Control voltages u_{wd} et u_{wq} will be as follows:




Figure 12. Schematic of the vector control strategy implemented in the statorside converter.

The complete scheme of the vector control strategy applied to the stator-side converter is represented in Fig. 12.

7. SIMULATION RESULTS

Using the electrical parameters of the machine (see Appendix), the reference voltage at the output of rectifier is taken as 1500 V. The simulation results of control strategies applied to the PMSG of is built using Matlab/Simulink/Power System environment.




Figure 13. Wind speed.




Figure 14. DC motor speed.




Figure 15. Mechanical (rotor) and reference speed.




Figure 16. isq-axis current.




Figure 17. Zoom of isd-axis current.




Figure 18. isd-axis current.




Figure 19. Three phase voltage.




Figure 20. Zoom of three phase voltage.




Figure 21. Electromagnetic torque.

The Fig.13 illustrates changes in the wind speed, v, for 10 seconds. This curve is obtained by a wind profile varying between 9m/s and 12m/s.

The Fig.14 shows the evolution of the speed of the motor, controlled by a reference torque obtained according to the diagram of Fig.6.It is observed that we have a good emulation of the DC motor speed to the wind speed, which demonstrates that DC motor behaves as the wind turbine and the emulation is well achieved Fig.13 and Fig.14.

This emulation is implemented such that the DC motor speed follows homothetically changing of wind speed.

Fig.15 shows that the speed rotor follows its reference with adaptation to wind speed.

The Fig.16, Fig.17 shows that the measured quadrature i_{sq} component of stator current follows their reference.

The torque is regulated by the generator side converter to extract maximum power from the wind turbine by using the MPPT strategy; these results demonstrate practically the dynamic performance of the selected controllers.

We see clearly in Fig.20, 21 that the tensions V_{abc} are sinusoidal whereas its frequencies and amplitudes are proportional to the wind speed.

8. CONCLUSION

In this paper, the emulation of wind turbine by using DC motor was proposed in order to emulate the real profile of wind. In order to maximize the exploited power from the wind we applied MPPT control with speed controller, this method shows its simplicity and its good control.

The simulation results show the Perfect tracking responses and robust characteristics. The results show that the PMSG is suitably adapted for wind power generation systems with high performance of the speed, flux and torque with the vector control. The control strategy of PMSG has been developed by using the rotor flux oriented control. To achieve that we imposed the direct stator current to zero in order to maximize the electromagnetic torque. The validity of the control strategy is discussed and implemented using Matlab/Simulink environment.
